Student/Parent Handbook

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

1. Take responsibility for learning.

This means:

- Arrive to school on time.
- Be prepared for class
- Demonstrate a serious and responsible attitude in daily work.
- Homework is carefully and thoughtfully completed and on time.

2. Try to settle differences in a peaceful manner.

This means:

- Respect other people's property and personal space.
- Do not physically or verbally fight with others.
- Do not take anything that does not belong to you.

3. Follow the directions of adults in charge, the first time.

This means:

- Look at the speaker
- Do not talk back to teachers or adults in charge.
- This includes substitutes and lunchroom supervisors.

4. Be sensitive to the needs and feelings of others.

This means:

- Use appropriate language at all times.
- Do not bully or tease other children
- Never boo or whistle in the auditorium.
- Be willing to help each other.
- Be friendly and courteous.

5. Move safely through the school.

This means:

- No playing around in bathrooms or hallways.
- No running in the lunchroom, hallways or up and down stairs.

**Our school is special.
Let's keep it that way!**

RULES OF CONDUCT FOR SECONDARY STUDENTS

Although rules are often more conveniently expressed in terms of prohibitions, it should be understood that every wise rule aims at a positive good – the betterment of our human nature. With this in mind, the following are **not** allowed at Holy Rosary Academy and during those times when the Academy is responsible for the students:

1. Possession or carrying of weapons
2. Possession of controlled substances (alcoholic beverages, tobacco products, drugs, etc.)
3. Theft, vandalism, cheating, plagiarism
4. Inappropriate and discourteous speech or behavior
5. Tattoos, body piercing, dying of hair with other than natural colors, inappropriate ornaments
6. Exclusive friendships or displays of affection - Students are at HRA to grow first in their faith, second in their intellect, and third in their healthy social interactions.
7. Use of telephones or leaving campus without permission - All cell phones must be checked in at the beginning of each day, or they are subject to confiscation.
8. Possession of cell phones, MP3 players, or other electronic devices: Student electronics are to be turned in to Mr. Welsh or their elementary teacher promptly upon arriving to school or school events. Failure to observe this rule will result in a demerit and loss of the item. *The first time an item is confiscated, it will be returned to the parents. The second time an item is confiscated, the Principal will not return it before the end of the school year after a discussion with the parents.
9. Inadequate hygiene (See Uniform Guidelines)
10. Missing any part of the uniform, or wearing it incorrectly
11. Truancy or deliberate tardiness with respect to class or other Academy functions
12. Consumption of energy drinks
13. Open beverage containers in lockers - Upper school students are not to bring coffee drinks into the school buildings. Drinks should be consumed before entering and the cups thrown away.

DISCIPLINE AND CONSEQUENCES

Teachers may issue other rules, general or particular, as circumstances warrant.

1. The Faculty and Administration determine appropriate penalties for violation of rules.
2. While the teacher is the first administer of discipline, the ultimate authority lies with the Principal. If the parent has spoken or met with the teacher and would like further recourse, the Principal is to be brought into the discussion. Final decisions are made by the Principal in conjunction with the Board of Trustees.
3. **Suspension:** Suspension from the Academy, assigned for more serious or repetitive offenses, can last from one to ten days. Suspension is assigned only by the Principal, and can occur either in or out of the school, at the Principal's discretion. Students receive no academic credit for days of suspension.

4. **Expulsion:** Expulsion from the Academy is reserved for the most serious violations of discipline. It is assigned only by the Principal.
5. Restitution for stolen or damaged school property will be charged to the parents of those responsible for the theft or damage.
6. **Uniform:** Students are to be in full proper uniform while they are in campus. If for any reason a student needs to change out of the uniform before leaving campus, this may not be done more than five minutes before departure. Students who do not wear the uniform as required will receive a demerit.
7. The posting of any comment or picture, by means of social media, e-mail, or any public forum, that threatens, demeans, or impugns the character of the Academy, its members, or any other person, is subject to disciplinary action including expulsion.

THE DEMERIT SYSTEM

The goal of discipline at HRA is to foster virtue within the students. When the teachers communicate both warnings and consequences to the student and parents when infractions occur, the student is given the opportunity to choose the good repeatedly. Students are assigned a demerit for infractions against the published rules and regulations of the school and individual classes.

- 1) The first infraction will result in a formal warning from the teacher. If the warning is ignored in the future, a demerit will be assigned.
- 2) After two demerits, the student will be given a warning letter to take home to be signed. The homeroom teacher will be alerted via email to send the child to the office to pick up his or her letter.
- 3) If the student reaches four demerits, Mrs. Furby will call the parents and determine the soonest Saturday that the child will serve detention for an hour. The student is to come in full formal uniform and will bring his or her school work although he or she may be subject to manual labor around the campus. The student reports to the Principal's office at the appointed time.
- 4) After six demerits, student will need to come to the office and bring home another warning letter. The homeroom teacher will be alerted via email to send him or her to the office.
- 5) After eight demerits, Mrs. Furby calls the parents and arranges the three-hour detention the student will serve on a designated Saturday in full formal uniform.
- 6) After ten demerits, a letter will be sent home indicating that suspension will ensue at twelve demerits. The letter will be mailed home and Mrs. Furby will call the parent.
- 7) If a student should insist on receiving sixteen demerits, the Principal and the parents will sit down to determine whether a second suspension or an expulsion is necessary.

****Upper School teachers reserve the right to take demerits for incomplete homework after a formal warning and a note home to the parents has been issued.**

*****Students begin with zero demerits again at the 2nd semester.**

CAMPUS DECORUM

Holy Rosary Academy extends warm hospitality toward all campus visitors and expects her students to treat speakers and other guests with courteous attention. Every student is expected to rise and greet guests when they enter the classroom.

When approaching a door or gate on campus, they are expected to open the door and step back, holding the door for adults and each other to pass through before them.

◆ Assemblies –

- All grades gather together at 8:00 a. m. on Monday mornings to begin the week with Morning Prayers and announcements. Parents and guests are always welcome to join the assembly.
- As we assemble, it is requested that all students be mindful of the potential for late comers and position themselves to allow plenty of room at the entrance.
- Any time there is a special assembly on campus, students are expected to proceed in a timely way to the event and pay courteous and respectful attention throughout.

◆ Dances & Prom –

- Guest passes are issued to the students for dances. Guest pass forms must be submitted by the deadline set prior to the event so that the Administration has time to make certain that all guests are aware of HRA rules and expectations. Students are accountable for their guest's decorum at the event and will be required to leave with their guest if the guest does not uphold the HRA standards of dress and conduct.
- The seniors must submit the guest pass forms to the Principal 24 hours before the dance.
- Music playlists must be submitted to the Senior Moderator 48 hours before the dance for approval. If the deadline is not met, the dance may be cancelled. **Any late submissions or changes to the playlist could result in the dance coming to an immediate end.**
- Attire should reflect the theme of the event, whether it be in formality of attire or a costume.
- Formal and semi-formal attire for gentlemen includes a properly fitted jacket, tie and dress shoes. For ladies, such attire allows modesty to enhance beauty with knee-length skirts or longer and are full enough to move and dance comfortably, and with sleeves or straps at least an inch and a half wide. It is always advised to have an accessory, such as a shawl, shrug or bolero jacket whenever a dress does not fully cover the shoulders. Dance shoes require heels that are wide enough to provide a sufficient platform of support.
- Standards for modest dress are enforced at all school related events, including dances and prom. Students who are inappropriately dressed will be given the opportunity to amend their attire or be asked to leave the event.
- Only 11th & 12th grades may invite a date to the prom. Deliberately ignoring this request may result in a 7th, 8th, 9th, or 10th grader being excluded from the dance.

◆ Sports activities –

- Holy Rosary Academy is known for good sportsmanship on and off the field. Students are strongly encouraged to attend games and support classmates who are playing in them. Students receiving a second warning from the coach or a referee about poor sportsmanship may be cut from the team.
- Elementary students will be allowed to play sports upon the recommendation of their primary teacher.
- ◆ Students are expected to uphold **the same standards of decorum** at any extracurricular activities as those of the classrooms and hallways of the school. Demerits may be issued during extracurricular activities if the situation demands it.

CHAPEL DECORUM

- ◆ Decorum, conduct and all aspects of student behavior in the John Paul II Chapel are governed by the Catholic belief in the Real Presence (Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity) of Jesus Christ in the tabernacle. The presence of Jesus in this special way makes the Chapel the most sacred and holy place on the HRA Campus. Thus, student conduct in Chapel must always be reverent and reflective of the awesome presence of Christ Himself.
- ◆ Upon entering and leaving the John Paul II Chapel all students are asked to genuflect on their right knee. The Latin rite Catholic practice of genuflection to the Tabernacle is an acknowledgment of the presence of Jesus (*“As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me...”* [Romans 14:11]). Catholics do this as an act of faith. Non-Catholics are expected to follow our practice out of respect for their Catholic brothers and sisters and for the sake of uniformity, but not as an act of faith.
- ◆ It is proper to genuflect whenever entering the chapel and any time one is crossing in front of the Tabernacle. The limited space in the chapel requires us to do this at the doorway rather than amidst the pews.
- ◆ Readers for Mass are to sit in the front pew rather than in their normal assigned pews. In order to accommodate the communion line, readers are to remain sitting after receiving Communion.
- ◆ Readers participating in the Mass are to make a profound bow to the altar upon crossing into or leaving the Sanctuary. If two readers are crossing the altar rail at the same time, they are to bow together in concert.
- ◆ All upper school students enter the communion line during Mass in order to either: receive Communion, receive a blessing, or continue to walk back to their seats respectfully without receiving the Eucharist or a blessing.
- ◆ Students will exit the pews for communion on the left and return to the pews from the right side. The priest will distribute the Host at the altar rail in a clockwise direction beginning at his seat and continuing toward the ambo.
 - ◆ **Preparing for Communion:** students should examine their consciences carefully before each Mass to determine whether they are prepared to receive Communion. Students should never feel pressured to receive Communion if they are not properly disposed to do so.

- ◆ In order to receive Communion on the tongue, students are to kneel at the altar rail with their hands clasped below the communion rail, their heads tilted up, and their mouths open.
- ◆ In order to receive Communion in the hand, students are to form a cup with their left hand over their right in a manner that will allow them to protect the Blessed Sacrament once it is placed in their hand by the priest. They are then able to place the Host in their mouths with their right hand.
- ◆ Male students will always keep their heads uncovered while in chapel. Female students may wear a chapel veil as a part of their school uniform. The use of the veil has been a beautiful custom of the Catholic Church as an expression of respect for the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. It is not required.
- ◆ Students in grades 7 – 12 are required to wear their dress uniform to Mass.
- ◆ **Adoration** – Adoration may be offered by opening the Tabernacle with the Blessed Sacrament in place, placing the Blessed Sacrament on the altar in a pix, or placing the Blessed Sacrament on the altar in a monstrance.
- ◆ It is the tradition of the school to make a double genuflection toward the Blessed Sacrament whenever it is exposed to view. Students will briefly genuflect on both knees and bow their heads with their hands clasped.
- ◆ A short greeting, such as, “My Jesus I adore You in the Sacrament of Your Love,” May be said silently as a way of knowing how long to remain on one’s knees in genuflection.

All-School Masses

All-School Masses are said in St. Dominic’s Hall. When the Hall is being used for Mass that space is to be treated as a chapel. Since there is no Tabernacle, some practices and procedures for Mass differ.

- ◆ Upper school students are to leave their books in their 2nd period class and proceed directly to Mass in a quiet and thoughtful manner, preparing themselves for the reality of what they are about to do.
- ◆ Enter St. Dominic’s Hall silently for Mass.
- ◆ Everyone will make a profound bow to the altar when sitting in the pews before Mass, when exiting the pews after Mass, and whenever crossing in front of the altar. It is appropriate to do this whenever the candles on the altar are lit for Mass, adoration, or prayer.
- ◆ Readers are to use seats provided near the left side of the stage rather than sitting in their assigned pews.
- ◆ Readers participating in the Mass will approach the altar from the left side aisle, make a profound bow on the left side of the stage and then proceed up the left steps to the ambo.
- ◆ When two readers are at the side of the stage at the same time, they are to bow together in concert.
- ◆ The Kindergarten, First Grade, and Second Grade students (who have not yet received their First Communion) will receive a universal blessing from the priest before he begins to distribute Communion to the older grades. The priest will approach the classes and they will remain standing in their place for the blessing. These three grades will remain standing and attentive and prayerful for the communion line. They will be encouraged to pray quietly or

sing with the student body. They will not approach the priest at the end of the Communion line for an individual blessing.

- ◆ All students in grades 3 – 12, and 2nd graders who have received their First Communion, enter the communion line during Mass in order to either: receive Communion, receive a blessing, or continue to walk back to their seats respectfully without receiving the Eucharist or a blessing.
- ◆ Jr. High boys will act as ushers to help students know when it is appropriate for them to enter the communion line.
- ◆ The communion line at All-School Masses will run down the center aisle. Students will return to their pews along the outside aisle on their side of the hall.

HOLY ROSARY ACADEMY

STUDENT ACTIVITIES/ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY

Holy Rosary Academy encourages its students to participate in extracurricular activities and athletic programs offered through our school. These programs are meant to afford students enjoyment and edification. They are, however, secondary to our academic program at HRA. Therefore, students whose academic performance falls below school expectations will be placed on academic probation. These students may neither practice nor play in games until the probation is lifted.

Further circumstances for probation:

- Students with Saturday detention must fulfill that obligation before they may participate in any game or tournament
- Students who miss the previous Friday or the following Monday after a tournament without administrative approval will be placed on academic probation for the week

- Students who miss more than half the day will not be permitted to participate in the practice or game that day
- Students struggling academically may be asked to forego spirit days, dances, or other extracurricular activities until the grades improve.

Note to Parents: The success of the students is dependent upon 100% commitment on the part of the students to attend EVERY practice, game and event scheduled. Absences from practices, games and events harm the whole and cripple the overall effort of the teams and organizations to succeed. Teaching the students the importance of virtuous self-sacrifice for the good of the team is perhaps the most important part of extracurricular activities.

- Elementary students will be allowed to play sports upon the recommendation of their primary teacher.

THE UNIFORM

Dressing each morning begins from the inside out. The first order of business is to make sure that students are personally clean and well groomed. The HRA uniform standards include healthy grooming habits and hygiene. Hair must be combed smooth each day as well as being cut to a suitable length and style.

All uniform items need to be clean and fit properly. Clothing needs to be washed at least once a week. Students should not be coming to school with stains and smudges on their uniforms.

Ladies: Grades 7 - 12

1. Clean and combed hair, styled to remain out of eyes
2. Hair may only be dyed a natural color
3. White blouse with peter-pan collar
4. Solid white undergarments
5. Green V-neck sweater
6. Plaid skirt (length to cover knees)
7. White, navy, black, or white cotton knee socks or tights, or nude pantyhose (No low cut or “no show” socks)
8. School tie or crisscross tie
9. Flats recommended, modest closed toe shoe, (heel may be maximum 1 ½ inches high and minimum 1 inch wide)
10. Jewelry limited to a watch and one appropriate piece on one wrist, one around the neck, one ring on one finger, and one small stud or dime sized hoop in each earlobe
11. Ladies in grades 9 - 12 may wear a modest amount of make-up and clear or French style nail polish only

Gentlemen: Grades 7 – 12

1. Clean and combed hair, trimmed to remain out of eyes and off collar
2. Hair may only be dyed a natural color
3. Clean shaven

4. Sideburns only to earlobe
 5. Solid white undershirts
 6. White dress shirt with button down collar
 7. Green V-neck sweater vest*
 8. Navy blazer
 9. Black or khaki uniform trousers
 10. Black belt with undecorated silver or dark buckle
 11. School tie
 12. Black shoes that can be polished
 13. Black dress socks
 14. No jewelry other than watches and religious items; limited to one on the wrist and one around the neck
- *Sweater vests must be worn on days students attend Mass.

Outdoor Clothing

Winter Clothing: Grades 7 – 12

Whenever there is snow on the ground, a coat and boots must be worn to play outdoors. Students who do not have proper outdoor clothing may not participate in outdoor activities.

P. E. Apparel: Grades 7 – 12

All students will need to purchase a school gym uniform and should come to school in their gym uniforms on their scheduled P.E. day in order to participate. Students who take P.E. must have two pairs of uniform sneakers: “recess” shoes and “P.E.” shoes. Students are to wear recess shoes and white athletic socks with these uniforms throughout the day. Both gym shoes and recess shoes should be a solid neutral color (white, black, or grey; accent colors may only be on the sole). The gym uniform includes **solid black** nylon or cotton sweat pants that are not form fitting, HRA tee shirt and jacket: HRA zip-up, (during cold weather, a solid green, white, grey or black hoody may be worn under the jacket.) The gym pants may not have any logos or striping unless the student is wearing the Dooley’s uniform pant.

Students who are not properly dressed will not be allowed to participate.

Dress Code for Non-Uniformed School Activities

“Teaching modesty to children and adolescents means awakening in them respect for the human person.” (CCC 2524) While the forms of modesty vary in each culture and climate, it is acknowledged that social norms can be an insufficient standard in a fallen world. HRA therefore concretely outlines the expectations for modest dress, which is expected at all school related activities, whether or not students are required to be in uniform.

- ◆ All clothing should fit the person wearing it. Garments should neither be too large nor too tight to move comfortably and gracefully.

- ◆ Appropriate undergarments will always remain completely concealed by a finished outfit when it fits properly.
- ◆ Shirts and tops that fit do not reveal a person's midriff when arms are raised, nor do they gape, pucker, or show tension creases in any part of the garment when the person moves normally.
- ◆ Thin white button-down shirts or sheer tops must have the proper undergarments worn under them.
- ◆ Modest neck lines do not descend more than four finger-widths below the lowest point of the collarbone.
- ◆ Modest clothing does not incorporate cut-out detailing that reveals bare skin.
- ◆ Professional styles of dress call for covered shoulders.
- ◆ One does not wear jewelry about the neck that shows when wearing a tie of any kind.
- ◆ Pants of any kind that fit properly will not cling to the leg.
- ◆ If pants have belt loops, a belt should be worn.
- ◆ Trousers that fit are long enough to cover the ankle bone.
- ◆ The natural waist is that line around the body that crosses through the navel. Most sweatpants and skirts are fashioned to be worn at the natural waist.
- ◆ Skirts are to be long enough to completely cover the knee cap from the front and the crease of the knee in back, when standing up straight.
- ◆ Tea-length is the name for the skirt length that ends mid-way between the knee and ankle.
- ◆ Mid-length to Bermuda-length shorts, with an inseam of at least seven to eight inches is appropriate casual attire in warm weather.
- ◆ In all cases, clothing should be clean and whole. Distressed or torn garments are unsuitable for school related activities.
- ◆ Slit skirts are treated as having the hemline at the top of the slit.
- ◆ Sleeveless dresses and tops should have straps at least an inch and a half wide.
- ◆ Modest garments do not have decorations or details that draw attention to the particular contours of the body, nor do they have images or messages that do so.
- ◆ Modest dress will never serve as a distraction to others or impede the process of normal activity.

Sporting Activities:

- ◆ Tee shirts are to be worn under loose fitting team jerseys.
- ◆ When the shorts of a sports uniform or training gear are shorter than mid-length, a pair of half-length leggings with a hemline just above the knee should be worn to accommodate activities while preserving modesty.

Nutrition Reminders

Nutritional breakfasts and lunches are essential to consistent performance in school. Please consider some of these suggestions as you prepare meals for your child(ren).

- ALWAYS be sure that your child has had some **breakfast** in order for the morning schoolwork to be successful. Avoid overly sugary cereals, however.
- Include forms of **protein** that energize the students and sustain them for the afternoon activities: nuts, chicken & lean meats, protein bars, eggs, cheese sticks, jerky, etc...
- **Vegetables and salads** are vitally important. Help your child discover a taste for them!
- Include fruits as they are slower carbs to absorb and contain important fiber. Dried fruit can be an easy alternative for a sack lunch.
- Send your child to school with **water**. Avoid the sugary drinks or sodas that also make your child crash after lunch.
- **Avoid foods with dyes in them**. The foods with red dye are particularly bad for the child. Among other problems, it accelerates hyperactivity and an inability to concentrate in many children.
- **AVOID processed foods** as much as possible. They contain too much sodium and little nutrition. Further, the sugar and salt content make the students sleepy after lunch.
- Avoid foods containing high amounts of sugar/simple or starchy carbohydrates or high sodium.
- **Eat and visit with your children at dinner whenever possible**. They may not share right away, but after a while they will begin to bubble over with the news of the day.

Pick-up and Drop-Off Procedures

Drop-Off in the Morning and Pick-Up in the Afternoon

- **Punctuality:** Supervision is provided for students beginning at 7:00 a.m. Students are to go to the Kolbe Library if they arrive before 7:40 a.m. The teacher in charge will open the Bosco building at 7:40 a.m. School begins promptly at 8:00 a.m.
- **Dismissal:** The school day ends at 3:10 p.m. All students are to be picked up **no later than 3:30 p.m.** The main classroom buildings will be locked at 3:30 p.m. Any remaining students will be sent to the after school programs and the family charged the appropriate rate for the time the child spends there.

Safety Procedures

- Please consider parking in the parking lot (or the second parking lot on the other side of Bosco if you would like to escort your child to his or her classroom.
- If you plan to drop your Upper School student off at Bosco, pull all the way around the horseshoe and drive up as far as you can before exiting the parking lot so that other cars can drop off behind you as well.
- Junior and senior students who drive are asked to park their cars on the other side of the Bosco Building and enter through the side gate.
- Please do not leave your car running in the parking lot to run your child in if you are not in a parking space.

- Currently, parents may drop their child off on the backside of the campus on 25th street in the morning **ONLY!** For the purposes of security, the gate will remain locked from 8:30 a.m. for the rest of the day.
- **Please be respectful of the reserved parking** along the right hand side of the parking lot as you are driving in. Those parking spaces are in active use.
- **ALWAYS BE ALERT FOR CHILDREN AND ADULTS WALKING THROUGH THE PARKING LOT. NO DRIVER SHOULD EXCEED 5 MILES AN HOUR IN THE PARKING LOT.**

Early Pick-Up Procedure

- Parents are asked to come in and sign-out their child at the front office.
- The Office Staff will then go to the appropriate classroom to bring the child to the office.
- The Office Staff prefers that the students do not come to the office to wait for the parents; it is better for the student to remain in class until the last possible moment before departure.
- Parents may call ahead and the Office Staff will bring the student to the office to coincide with the signing out as well.

Absences and Tardies

Absence Policy

- **The School depends on parents/guardians to take responsibility for the consistent and on-time attendance of the student.** All students share the responsibility of being on-time.
- The school asks that the parents call in to confirm an absence between 7-8 A.M. as the Office Manager can field the call and alert the affected teacher. Please call each day the student is absent. Your call serves as the “note” for absence. **If you do not call in, expect a phone call from the Office by 10 A.M.**
- Upon return to the school, the student does not need to check into the office but simply goes back to class.
- Each teacher will indicate the “make-up” policy for homework, quizzes and tests in his or her rules and regulations handout out to students at the start of the school year.
- The Upper School students will be asked to stay after school in the After School Learning Lab to make-up quizzes and tests.
- Parents and Students who know that they are leaving for a **long-term trip** (five school days or more) should type up a letter to that effect and distribute it to all his or her teachers as well as the Principal at least two weeks before departure. This is the most courteous way to give the teachers plenty of time to prepare the materials in advance.
- **Excused absences** - Absences will only be classified as excused by the Principal if the parents clearly notify her in a timely way and she and the faculty agree to the student’s extended absence. Illness and personal days are not excused.
- **Truancy is a serious offense.** It violates State Law and is frowned upon at HRA. Students caught missing from school without their parents’ or the school’s permission will need to

meet with the Principal. Parents will be asked to be in attendance. The School will determine if the truancy merits a detention, suspension, or expulsion. Multiple truanancies will merit expulsion.

- **Excessive Absences (15 or more)** Students absent from the Academy for more than 15 days in any course or courses within a school year will not be able to pass those courses without a meeting with the Principal and permission of the teachers involved.

Tardy Policy

- **Students arriving late for the beginning of the day will merit a tardy.** Students arriving to school late are to go to the Office for a tardy slip before being admitted to class. Parents need not come in and sign in their child although parents are not prevented from seeing their child to his or her classroom door to be certain of entrance into the class. It is helpful if a parent who knows his or her child will be tardy for first part of the day calls the school so that the Office can alert the teacher.
- Parents are asked to be aware of how disruptive it is for your child to be chronically tardy. Not only is your child thrown off for the rest of the day, but he or she is disrupting the class and keeping the necessary morning harmony from fully ensuing. It is a serious disruption and parents are asked to take special care not to make tardies a habit. Not only does it harm the child, but it fosters in them lifelong tardy habits that can be crippling to their lives. The student begins to suffer academically as well.
- **Excessive Tardiness** - After 10 unexcused tardies, Miss Neumayr will meet with the student and parents to discuss whether the problem can be corrected. Five further tardies will result in another meeting and could result in the student failing the class or leaving the school.
- **In the Upper School, students have three minutes between classes** to take care of restroom needs, water breaks, and visits to the locker. Students who know that they will need to make a restroom stop may want to have their books for the next couple classes with them so that they can make a beeline to the restroom and use the three minutes wisely. Students arriving late to any class after first period will receive a “tardy demerit.” Given the short distance from one end of the Bosco Building to the other (taking a maximum of thirty seconds), the school expects students to arrive in class on time and prepared for class.

“SNOW DAY” POLICY

- Generally, icy roads prompt school closures rather than snow. These decisions are made city wide based upon whether public school busses can safely transport students in the current weather and road conditions and the safety conditions of bus stops and public trails around the city that are used for school commuting.
- Holy Rosary Academy **always** cancels classes when the Anchorage School District determines that the roads are not safe enough for student travel. **If ASD closes public schools, HRA will also be closed.** In the event that only certain parts of town are given a

“snow day”, families from those neighborhoods have the option of keeping their children home with an excused absence rather than drive treacherous roads.

- ASD determines school closures by 4:00 a.m. HRA will post this information, redirecting families to the ASD announcement by 6:00 a.m.

PROCEDURE FOR ANNOUNCING “SNOW DAYS”

- Miss Neumayr will alert Miss DiCiero who will post the closure on Sycamore and the HRA website. Elementary teachers are to e-mail their students’ families to confirm the school closure. Upper school homeroom teachers are to text/e-mail students to confirm the school closure. Miss DiCiero will be in the front office from 7:00 – 9:00 a.m. in order to field phone calls and confirm the school closure. Check television or radio news casts or the ASD website to confirm Snow Day warnings.
